## Fr Bob Writes ...

This year April 1st brings us straight into the Triduum, the three days that Christians have been commemorating the death and resurrection of Jesus since Apostolic times, because his death and resurrection are at the heart of Christian salvation.

We begin on Holy Thursday (Maundy Thursday) evening at S. Andrew's (7.00pm) with the liturgy of the Lord's Supper, at which our Lord gave us the Eucharist - which we are privileged to be able to celebrate daily here in the Parish of Paignton. This liturgy has festive and joyful overtones, as bells ring and the Gloria is sung out with gusto! Vestments are the festive colour of white. This service concludes in procession to the Blessed Sacrament Chapel with the consecrated bread – which is used for communion next day. After the stripping of the altars the Watch begins, we wait quietly with the Lord until midnight.

The Good Friday liturgy is at 2.00pm in S. Boniface, where we keep the anniversary of the death of Jesus on the cross just outside the walls of Jerusalem, a day of quiet, sadness and mourning for the crucified and dead Jesus. This is the one day in the year the Eucharist is not celebrated, respecting the sacrificial action of Jesus on the cross. It is traditional that we venerate and kiss the cross, before receiving from the reserved sacrament of the night before. Until recent times Good Friday was kept in a quiet and solemn atmosphere, with shops and places of work closed.

By the second century, Christians celebrated the Great Easter Vigil, an event which began the night of Holy Saturday, continuing until dawn on Easter morning. During this vigil, Christians commemorated salvation history, awaited the return of Jesus, and celebrated the

resurrection of Jesus at dawn on Easter Sunday. It was at the vigil that catechumens, after a three year period of catechesis, were baptized and received first communion. The Easter Vigil was the most important day of the liturgical year.

This liturgy of the Easter Vigil has four clearly defined parts: the service of light, the liturgy of the word, the celebration of baptism, and the Eucharist.

Our celebration of the Easter Vigil is at the Parish Church starting at 8.00pm, we begin in darkness, the new fire is lit and the Paschal Candle lighted, and blessed, as we move through the Nave and up the aisle to the altar the candles held by the congregation are lit.

This return of light symbolizes the resurrection of Jesus from the grave and the light of salvation and hope God brought into the world through the resurrection, the triumph of the light of God's grace and salvation over the darkness of death and sin. After the singing of the Exsultet (the ancient Easter Song of Praise), the church suddenly springs into light, to reveal the church decorated with flowers and especially the Easter lilies, the organ and music change to celebratory mode, the bells ring and we lift our voices as we celebrate the Risen Christ, with the singing of the Gloria. This is followed by the liturgy of the word and the blessing of the Baptismal Water and the Renewal of our Baptism Vows. Then the natural and proper climax of the whole Easter liturgy is the Eucharist, in which we are sacramentally reunited with our risen Lord.

So let us conclude our Lenten journey by the keeping of this three day commemoration of Jesus' passion, death and resurrection.

The Easter Message – Jesus is Returning. John 20: V7 “The cloth that had been on Jesus' head, not lying with the linen wrappings, but rolled up by itself.”

In Jewish tradition the folded cloth had to do with Master and Servant. When the servant set the dinner table for the master, he made sure that it was exactly the way the master wanted it. The table was furnished perfectly, and the servant would wait just out of sight, until the master had finished eating, and the servant would not touch the table until the master had finished. Now if the master had

finished eating, he would rise from the table, wipe his fingers, his mouth and clean his beard, and would wad up the cloth and toss it across the table. The servant would then know to clear the table because in those days the wadded cloth meant “I'm done”. But if the master got up from the table, and folded his cloth and laid it beside the plate, the servant would not touch the table, because the folded cloth meant, “I'm coming back!”

Jesus is coming back!

May the God whose loving powers shatters tombs, shatter any doubt in me.

### Bell Ringing News

*Holy Week and Good Friday*

Paignton ringers keep to the tradition of not ringing during Holy Week until Good Friday. The bells, other than the tenor, the heaviest bell, will be half muffled, to make this special and solemn occasion. Paignton is not unique in ringing on this day, although not many other churches do, however Paignton have probably rung continuously for more Good Fridays than most other churches.

*Forthcoming event – Coach outing*

Paignton Ringers' May Day Outing for 2010 is being organised as a coach trip up to Ross on Wye. This is an ancient rural market town where we intend to spend our lunch time. The 700 year old parish church of St. Mary's is the town's most prominent landmark and its tall pointed spire is visible when approaching the town from all directions. The church holds several distinctive tombs, one of which – that of a certain William Rudhall (d.1530) – is one of the last great alabaster sculptures from the specialist masons of Nottingham, whose work was prized across medieval Europe.

The Plague Cross was erected in the church yard in 1637 as a memorial to 315 local people who died of the plague that year.

The town is known for its antique shops, market square with its market hall and high number of public houses. Regular Thursday and Saturday markets are held at the red sandstone Market House building in the town centre, which was built between 1650 and 1654 replacing an older building.

Opposite the church, The Prospect is a neat public garden offering a view of the famous horseshoe bend in the River Wye as well as pleasant views as far as the Black Mountains. The ruins of Wilton Castle lie to the west of the town, the Castle has now been fully restored and is now open to visitors.

### Parish Giving Officer

As St Paul says, God loves a cheerful giver. Would you like to spread cheerfulness in the parish?! Parishes across the diocese have been asked by James Hutchings (Mission Resources Officer) to nominate somebody as a Parish Giving Officer (PGO). The idea is for there to be someone who James can keep in touch with regarding ideas about encouraging giving of time, talents and

money. Unlike many church roles it would not involve much time and certainly not on a weekly basis. If you are someone who enjoys communicating with others and is excited about the ministry and mission of the church here, this could be for you (NB you don't have to be a figures person)! It is up to each parish how they do it, but the sort of things the PGO might do include:

- \* putting something about giving into the parish magazine every so often - a verse from scripture or some encouraging information about the positive impact of our church on people locally. And encouraging preachers/teachers in church to talk about why we give and how we should do it

- \* at the time of the annual parochial church meeting, finding someone (ie doesn't have to be you!) in the church who will write a few words and perhaps some photos to go with the usual financial reports, to illustrate what everyone's giving has enabled to happen in the past year

- \* once a year, work with the treasurer and PCC to have an annual review of giving in the parish. James can work with you on suggesting ideas for how to do this. It doesn't have to be complicated and it should be done as a team

- \* at a different time of the year, once a year, arranging for everyone who gives of their time and money, to be thanked by letter.

- \* keeping in touch with ideas about giving through James' network of other PGOs. Largely this would be done through e-mail, but there will be occasional PGO events to which you will be invited if you wish to learn more.

If you are interested in finding out more please let either Fr Bob, Ron Edinborough, Mavis Hawkins or Ann Howard know. It would be good to be able to appoint a Parish Giving Officer at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting on Sunday April 25<sup>th</sup>.
