Meanwhile, standing near the cross of Jesus were his mother, and his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary Magdalene. 26When Jesus saw his mother and the disciple whom he loved standing beside her, he said to his mother, 'Woman, here is your son.' 27Then he said to the disciple, 'Here is your mother.' And from that hour the disciple took her into his own home.

John 19. 25b-27 Study Notes

Read the passage slowly and reflectively

- Note anything that particularly strikes you and refer to the notes if they are helpful.
- Spend a few moments in quiet reflection

V25. As in the synoptics, a group of Jesus' women disciples including Mary of Magdala witness his crucifixion (Mark 15:40). Only John mentions the mother of Jesus at the cross, and where the synoptics report the women as watching only at a distance (Matt 27:55), John mentions them as standing by the cross. Vv 26-27. In John, Mary only appears here and at the wedding at Cana (2.1-12) and in both cases Jesus addresses her as 'woman' (2.4). The use of the title 'the mother of Jesus' allows Mary to serve a larger symbolic role in the gospel narrative than if she had simply been named. At Cana she appeared as the model of the church, the singular embodiment of the faithful people of God. At the cross she appears as the mother of the church.

In a basic sense Jesus entrusts his mother to the care of the beloved disciple as an act of love for her. In antiquity, women without a male protector, especially those of lower classes had little or no social standing and few societal protections. They depended on a male usually a husband or a son for survival. When Jesus dies Mary will be left without a husband or son to care for her and so Jesus gives her into the beloved disciples care for her own survival. But this act has dimensions deeper than Jesus' practical care for his mother. Jesus first says to his mother 'here is your son' who is the son to whom Jesus refers? In one sense, son refers properly to Jesus himself, for as her biological son he is addressing Mary. But the context also suggests that the 'son' applies to the beloved disciple because of what Jesus says to him 'here is your mother'. By naming his own mother as the mother of the beloved disciple, Jesus reveals a specific spiritual relationship between himself and the beloved disciple, both of them are Mary's sons. The evangelist concludes 'from that hour the disciple took her into his home' This also has a deeper spiritual meaning than the disciple simply taking Mary into his care. The verb 'took' is translated everywhere in the gospel as 'receive' often to express the receiving of heavenly realities.

Questions for reflection:

- Does your celebration of Mothering Sunday reflect your sense of belonging to the family of the Church?
- 2. How might you develop that sense of 'family' across the congregation and in partnership with other local church communities?
- 3. When you need to share a loved ones pain, by just being present, might it help you to ask Mary, Our Lady of Sorrows, who has been in the same pace we are to intercede for us?

Read the passage for a final time and give thanks to God for the gift of his holy word.
